After a short leave at Plymouth Albion sailed in September and retraced its route past Gibraltar and eventually crossing the equator. At first it became warmer and warmer but as we approached the Cape of Good Hope the weather became cooler. We rounded the Cape passing Cape Town on a clear evening. The ship now returned to a northerly course and put in at Durban. The Albion was in Durban for 5 days and hospitality ashore was in great evidence. After leaving Durban we proceeded up the east coast of Africa and again crossed the equator. We were heading for Mombassa but the situation in Aden was now deteriorating rapidly and we recieved a signal to proceed to Aden at full speed.

The port of Aden, annexed by Britain in 1839 was the first territorial gain of the Victorian Empire. Dominated by the arid red cliffs of an extinct volcano, its sparse population was reported to be in "a condition of most indigent poverty and neglect". Aden had neither wealth nor beauty, but it did possess a fine harbour which provided anchorage for ships en route for Imperial India. The Raj ended in 1947, but Aden's value as a military base increased as the turbulent tide of Arab nationalism swept British forces out of Egypt, Iraq and Jordan. By the 1950's the same tide was stirring Aden. An attempt was made to control the upsurge — and secure the military base — by merging the colony with the tribalistic and British protected States of the South Arabian Federation. But this provoked worse trouble. By 1964 Britain faced a bloody terrorist campaign waged with lavish supplies of Soviet arms and strident encouragement and support from President Nasser of Egypt. The terrorist campaign against British rule in Aden began in 1963. After 2 years of mounting violence, the British government announced that it would grant independence no later than 1968 and that it would then abandon its military base in Aden for good. Meanwhile it appealed to all sides for restraint. Determined to achieve independence immediately and on their own terms, the two main terrorist groups reacted by plunging into further bloodshed against the British and each other.

On one side stood the Egyptian backed 'Front for the Liberation of South Yemen' (FLOSY) on the other was ranged the fanatically Marxist 'National Liberation Front' (NLF) And in between was the British soldier. Women and children were fair game for terrorist bullets and bombs and senior Government officials were warned that they would be shot one by one, like dogs. Rioting and arson accompanied the shooting and bombing, and schools, churches and synagogues went up in flames.

Unwilling to spend more lives for the privilege of being an Imperialist Aunt Sally Britain announced that she was hurrying forward independence day to November 30th 1967.

After 128 years of imperial rule, the British withdrawal from Aden in 1967 was a sombre and unpleasant affair. Instead of cheering crowds, the streets of Aden, with shuttered shops, echoed only to the roar of armoured cars and the whine and rattle of rooftop gun battles between the rival Arab contenders for political power. And at Khormaksar airport, scene of the biggest airlift operation since that of Berlin in 1948, exploding mortar bombs sped the 16,000 departing British servicemen on their way.

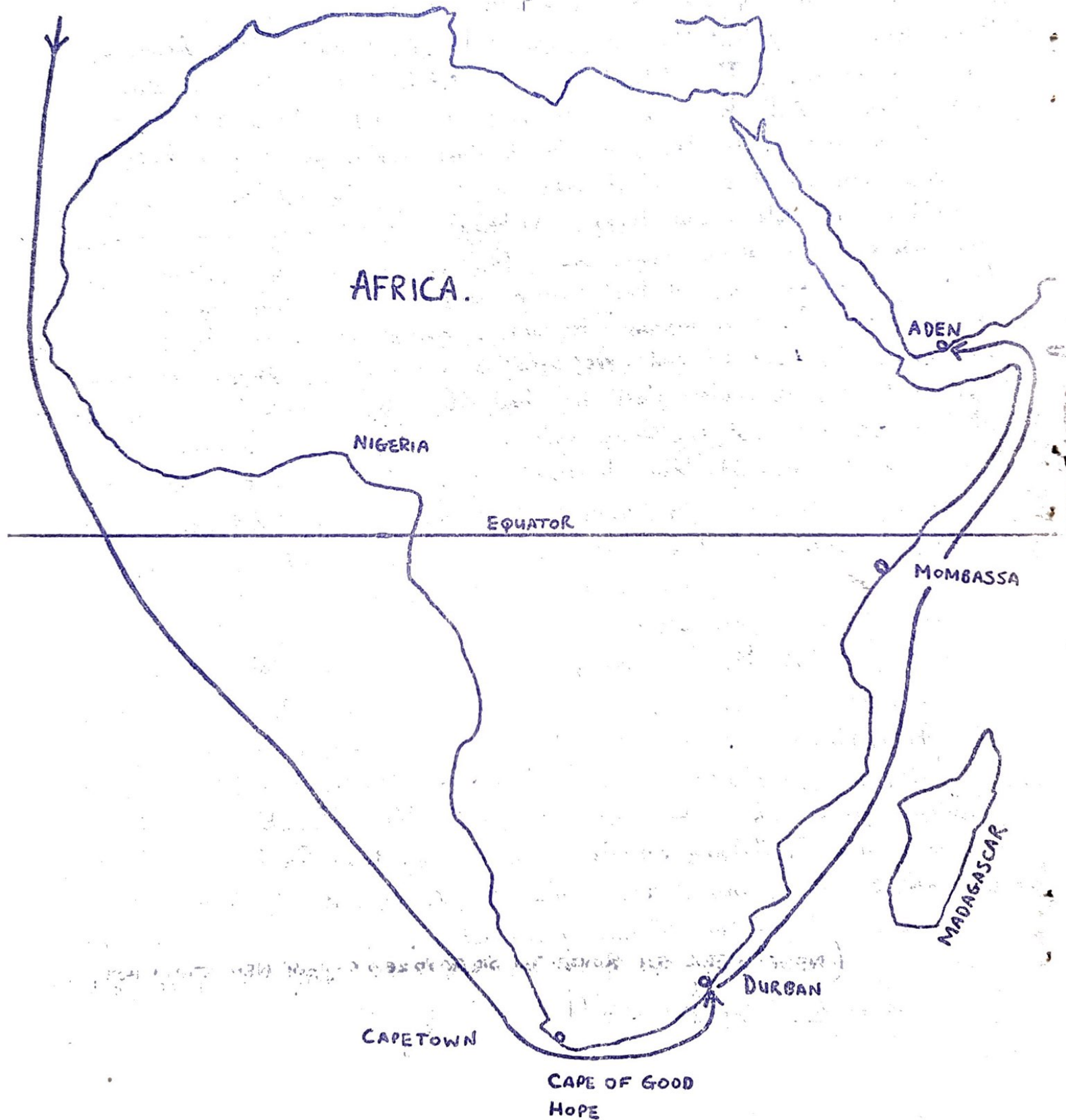
HMS. Albion supplied the rear guard troops whilst other Army units were flown out. The Fleet carrier EAGLE provided air cover after the R.A.F. had left. It was a thankless task for those ashore, something similar to the job the British serviceman has in Belfast to-day. The worst part of it was the uncertainty and the knowledge that something terrible could happen without any warning. On one occasion our observation point came under fire from a nearby building. The fellow alongside was at that moment surveying the building through his binoculars. The next moment he was sprawled out on his back clutching his face. In fact he had experienced a miraculous escape. A bullet had hit the binocular glass but had then been deflected up the 'tube' of the glasses and it came out near the eyepiece and creased his skull just above the ear. In fact he was left with two beautiful black eyes caused by the impact of the binoculars. Others were not so lucky, usually a bullet in the back from a hit and run terrorist was their fate. I know I was glad to see the back of the place, mainly to get a good nights sleep.

On Nov. 28th the last troops left the troubled colony. On the same day the High Commissioner, Sir Humphrey Trevelyan, flew off by helicopter to HMS. EAGLE without a hint of ceremony — just a terse message of "happiness and prosperity" to the new Peoples Republic of South Yemen of which Aden was now part. Union Jacks still flying bravely over military depots were hauled down for the last time at sunset on November 29th and the rearguard, the MAOT team and the men holding the perimeter of Khormaksar airfield finally flew out.

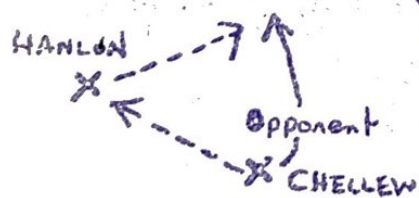

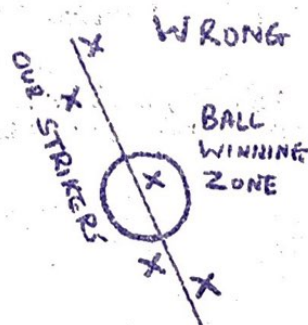
It was very noticeable on Saturday that we did not take into consideration ground conditions. By this I mean one must adapt to the state of the pitch. It was fairly obvious that even with Naughton's big goal Kicks the ball was not going to reach as far as it usually does. Why therefore did we have some extra "spectators" standing on the centre line. Of course I am talking about our forwards. Remember we are a team, we should all be playing together and helping each other out. So in future strikers lets have a bit more co-operation — help out the defence especially when they are having an 'off day'. Naughton must have thought there was a trampoline in the middle of our half considering the ease with which the ball was 'bouncing' back to him from clearances. Second point. Every time the ball is cleared by a goalkeeper it must be won. You must challenge every long ball. At times the only person going for long Kicks arriving in midfield was the unfortunate Ref. If only I had been playing I reckon I could have scored three hat-tricks with the lack of challenge in midfield. Third point. If you lose the ball go and get it back — don't fade out of the scene for twenty minutes. Fourth point. If you have time on the ball use it. No wild kicking that sends the ball skidding away at an angle of 90° straight to an opponents eager feet. Fifth point. If you commit yourself to a tackle do it in a determined manner. Saturdays pitch was tailor made for getting stuck in. If you see a team mate going in to tackle cover him and if the second player is also beaten there should be a third player giving cover and so on. Don't expect the goalie to work miracles. Naughton must have thought he was standing in front of an express train at times — the ease at which Prescott 'strolled through' in the second half. Sixth point. Run into spaces off the ball. Even if it brings no reward or passes throughout an entire game. Remember you can have a good game without even touching the ball. Get into the right place at the right time. Even if you are ignored it is odds on that you will draw a defender out of position. Seventh point. The easy way out of trouble in defence is to use the one-two. Don't try to dribble past an opponent. Do it like this.

You can work on this together. Eighth point. If a team mate is taking a throw in move around — run into spaces — go and help him.

You will take opponents with you. But never just stand around. Remember Challenge every ball — win it — move it around — run, run, run and we will return to winning ways.

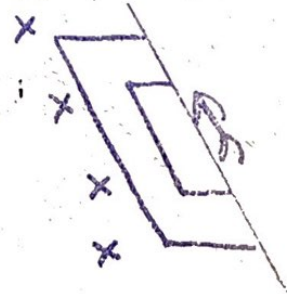

Early goals in either half proved invaluable insurance against a very strong home side, who left it very late in the second half to show the form which had rendered them invincible to this point in the season.

For the first ten minutes or so, it seemed that Prescott might be able to take advantage of what seemed a lethargic performance by Institute, but sterling work by the back four, particularly Brockenbrow and Pinnington, saved the side from an early drubbing. The home side's chances were not increased by their forward's reluctance to observe the offside situation: four times in as many minutes the wingers were caught looking for a long easy ball in preference to graft and variety. Institute were operating below their usual standard to this point, with the midfield centre being left in the sole care of Prescott's team.

A splendidly taken goal by Hanley brought Institute into the game. It was clear that the poor weather conditions were doing little to help the standard of football and consequently, Creedon's energetic and elegant sorties along the right flank provided welcome relief for the onlooker. One such run culminated in the first goal, as Creedon beat his man well and crossed to see the ball deflected into the path of HANLEY whose first-time flick entirely eluded the goalkeeper. Institute now began to play as they can, and the competition remained balanced until the interval.

Half-time: Prescott 0 - 1 Institute

Advice given to both sides at the break seemed to sharpen enthusiasm, especially for the tackle. An increasing degree of "needle" was evident, as Prescott strove to protect their record, in fact the contributions of several home players would have been equally felt without the presence of a football. HANLEY added to their frustration with his second goal after some enterprising play by Beckles. Prescott became pre-occupied with with revenge of any sort, and it became necessary for the referee, who handled the game fairly and sensibly, to reprimand several of the home players.

The midfield again became a no-go area for the visitor's trio, so new signing Smith was introduced for Beckles (who had mislaid his earlier fluency) in an attempt to tighten up the central playing area. However, this did not occur, and Prescott can be counted unlucky not to have converted several of the many chances which fell their way, especially in the advanced stages of play.

~~MARK~~ Nevertheless, an away win against such formidable opponents, and on a difficult pitch, is to be commended. The benefits of a strong team performance, when virtuosos are not in tune, were evident.

Eventually the pressure paid off when HOLLEWELL brilliantly beat three men on the left and fired home a well struck goal into the roof of the net. Institute could now sense victory and they surged forward for a second goal, powered by a determined midfield, but on one of the rare Prescott counter attacks a mix up occurred over a back pass, the ball appeared to stick in the mud as WILKINSON advanced to receive the back pass but LEUNG seeing the ball stick in the mud kicked the ball too hard and well out of the goalkeeper's reach to save it so again Prescott took the lead. The 2ND XI reacted quickly and showed a great deal of fight and determination. M'HUGH came forward for a corner and the clearance from the corner landed in front of him, he pushed the ball forwards and struck a 20 Yards shot into the net. The 2ND XI again pressed forward and with good approach work HOLLEWELL snatched the winner. FIRST YEARS FIGHT BACK TO DRAW

In an exciting match at Prescot on Saturday the first year team fought back from two goals down to draw and in fact were unlucky not to win. Prescot took the lead after 20 minutes when Bailey was rather slow to come out to a long through ball and he lost possession to a Prescot forward who tapped the ball into the net. Institute fought back well and a good effort by Eyo was saved by the goalkeeper at the foot of the post. Just before half time Prescot had a chance to increase their lead when a weak back pass gave a Prescot forward a chance to intercept but Bailey made up for his earlier mistake with a good save.

The teams turned round with Prescot rather fortunate on the balance of play to be ahead. 1st XI UNLUCKY TO LOSE IN CLASSIC GAME

The game started off badly for the Institute, and for the first ten minutes it looked as if the classy S.F.X. side were going to walk away with the game. But this was not to be. The Institute back four held out stubbornly, and when S.F.X. did get through they found RICE in outstanding form. Institute gradually came into the game more and more and, after about 15 minutes a fast break down the left by JOHNSTONE saw the ball skidding past the S.F.X. keeper right across the face of the goal with just that final touch lacking from our forwards. A break from S.F.X. saw their centre forward clear but RICE charged out of goal and snatched the ball from his toe. Then CAVANAGH took the ball from deep in the defence and ran right through. His shot beat the keeper but unfortunately it went a foot past the post. With about 10 minutes of the half remaining an attack by the very impressive S.F.X. midfield players left our defence a little open and a shot from their left wingers just beat RICE in goal, and despite a brave effort by WOODWARD to clear off the line, the ball managed to crawl into the net off the post. This did not discourage the 1st XI and the rest of the half was more or less even, and at half time S.F.X. were probably just deserving their one goal advantage.

After a stern half time talk from M^r LEA, the Institute came out refreshed and reorganised, and attacked S.F.X. right from the start.

WINDEVER and M^r GOVERN got through a lot of good work in midfield though M^r GOVERN was not quite his usual magic self this week. GRANT, having a fine game at left back kept S.F.X. attacks down this side to a minimum along with some fine covering by WILKINSON.

BROCKENBROW and JOHNSTONE were starting to work well together with VIP doing a lot of effective running down the right flank. After about an hour's play, a throw in was taken on the half way line on the right by VIP. CARRAN touched the ball inside to M^r GOVERN who split the defence with a perfect through ball, but JOHNSTONE was unlucky to be adjudged offside. Some tactical changes saw the tenacious CAVANAGH move up front, VIP dropping back into midfield and CARRAN joining the back four. These moves improved an already impressive display by Institute. A great solo effort by WINDEVER forced the S.F.X. keeper into a good save, knocking the ball onto the bar and out for a corner.

A long clearance from the S.F.X. keeper caused quite a bit of problem and a lone S.F.X. forward managed to score despite brave efforts to foil him.

Despite losing this was a first class performance from the 1st XI, and if the same effort is put in against the opposition whom we are now going to face for the rest of the season, then we should achieve some long overdue good results.

In a fast, exciting, game Institute were a little unlucky to be beaten, but most players performed well, especially in a great second half. The defence was weakened by the absence of Harper, and Derbyshire had to go off after 15 minutes with an ankle injury - and so it was not surprising that the defence was not as dominant as usual. Rice had a promising debut in goal, and could not be faulted for the goals. Prescott led 1-0 at half-time, and our most notable efforts were a header from Mitchell which was scrambled off the line, a quick turn and shot from Manifold just past the post, and a shot from Lawlor which was well-held by the keeper. Prescott scored 2 further goals, and so Mitchell was moved to centre-forward. With his first touch of the ball he shrugged off the challenge of 2 defenders, moved forward, and shot past the keeper. A few minutes later he was through again: his shot was well saved, but from the great corner-kick, Virtue headed in well - 3-2. Prescott scored again, but we still had time. We won another corner, and from Lawlor's great, inswinger, Curlett headed in: 3-4. Mitchell burst through to the line and crossed across the face of the goal, but nobody had followed up! Mitchell then ran straight through again, but with only the keeper to beat, he slipped the ball the wrong side of the post - nobody is perfect! With the last kick of the game, Prescott made it 3-5. A defeat is never very enjoyable, but this weakened side had enough chances to earn at least a draw, and several players performed admirably, above all Mitchell and Jarman, who had to hold the make-shift defence together.
