TRAGIC MOMENT RESULTS IN UNDESERVED DEFEAT

SECOND YEAR FOOTBALL

The team has been busy since the last time I reported, playing several very difficult matches. The results were mixed, and I think it would be fair to say that the lads are suffering a little from playing too much football - both for the school and for their league teams at the weekend, and that's why I have cancelled our extra match this week. Here are short summaries of games played:

ANFIELD 4 INSTITUTE 1

We struggled to find 11 players on a Thursday night, as Tarran and Cortlett were off school. The first half was a dismal performance, with several players looking out of touch. Our goal came from Mansford when the Anfield off-side trap failed. One of their goals seemed clearly off-side.

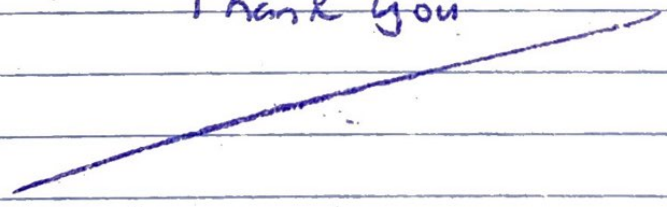
