Usually timing our return at about 0459 just in time to turn to for the days work. After about 7 weeks of this life I suddenly realised I had completely cut out the necessity for sleep.

The flyers were a real eye opener. The drivers drove like madmen and they all had big diesel Mercedes. Usually black ones. In these cabs you would often find nine or even eleven people. Everywhere they drove they would beep their horns trying to attract trade. So if you got in a taxi you would never know just who you may have to share with. Of course as it was a shared journey, and the driver could collect many fares on route so to speak no-ones fare was high a couple of bucks would take you 8 or nine miles into the city. (4/8d in old money.) for you youngsters about 24 p.

I rarely saw a road accident in Singapore but when one considers the crazy driving this is amazing.

One of the best things about Singapore was the swimming pools. Every unit (barracks, camp etc) had several and many a time I would have four or five swims a day. The working rig was just shorts so there was no bother about getting changed. Of course the climate was ideal always in the 80's. That was no good for work though. But as none of us ever did any work that was no bother.

Right enough rambling from yours truly. This is where I stop. END.

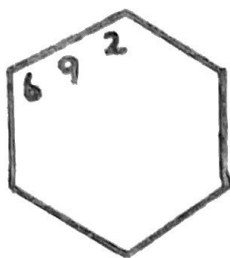
