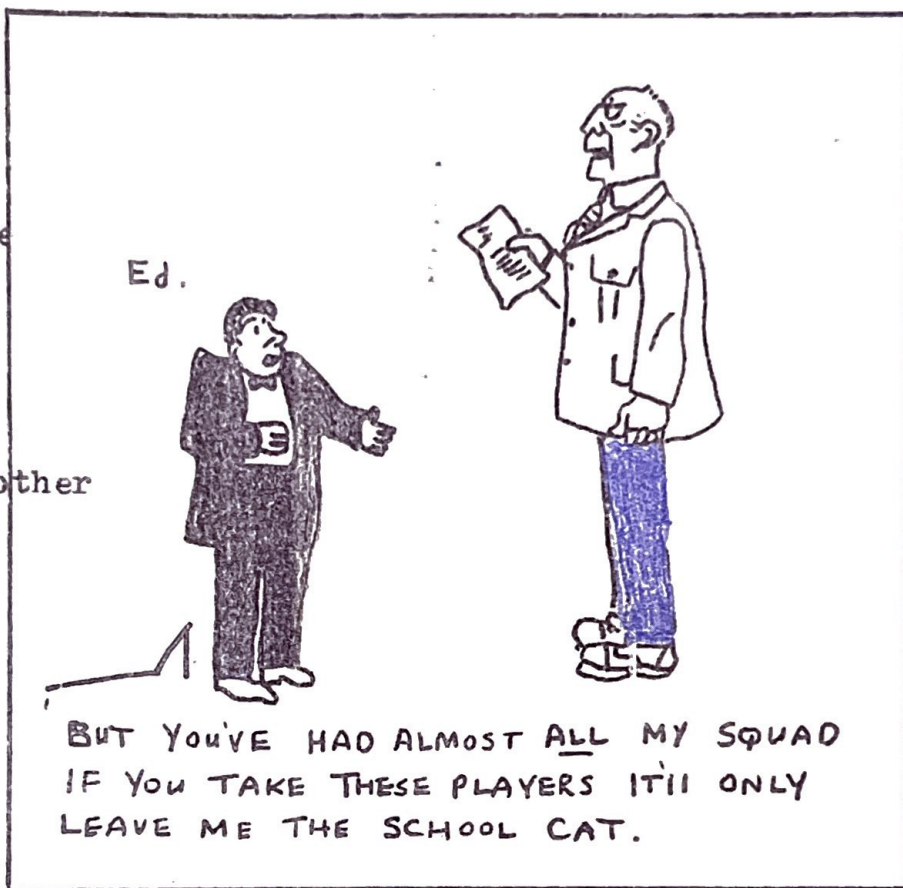
Alsop 4 Institute First year 3. Huthhin Swinnerton Yarwood.

Another Alsop goal and Institute would find it very difficult to recover. Lintott tried a long 'outside of the foot' shot that bounced near the goalpost. Hassell and Barker again showed some nice touches but in the 18th minute the goal came for Alsop. There was no cover in our defence and a forward sent in an unstoppable shot. Institute were playing a too "nice" game. Instead of turning down the screws on Alsop we were allowing them too much time and not making them pay for one or two errors. Also Flanagan was playing a waiting game for an Alsop error in defence. On at least six occasions he was just one player from a real break through. However this mistake never arrived and instead of creating his own chances Flanagan played almost no part in the second half. Alsop now missed a 'sitter' but this also happened at the other end. Flanagan passed well to Tony Jones who sent over a great ball to Lintott. From just three yards Lintott 'blasted' the ball over the bar. This was a vital miss for now all the 'stuffing' was knocked out of Institute. Another Alsop 'sitter' was missed before they scored number three minutes from the end. Their forward ran right through the centre with no challenge from an Institute player. Alsop hit the post seconds from time.

Institute took a somewhat surprising lead in the fifth minute. The goal followed Alsop pressure and came from a break that started in the Institute half. Yarwood 'took off' and as he approached the goalkeeper shot hard for goal. This was a reasonable shot that the goalkeeper 'palmed' down to the feet of Hutchin. Hutchin sent in a hard shot that again deflected off the goalie and ended up in the back of the net. Further Alsop pressure followed but again Institute 'broke out'. This time Yarwood shot too soon and a good chance was lost. Bohanna was showing up well in defence and he made a good header out from a dangerous Alsop move. Now came yet another Institute break and again it was Yarwood who found himself clear. He was a little hesitant on this occasion and the only result was a corner kick. Yarwood sent over some 'deadly' corners in the first half and he was in almost all the Institute attacking play. Raynard won a fine tackle just before Yarwood went on another long dribble before sending over a centre that was far too powerful. The ball evaded everybody. Rimmer was having some difficulty in defence and on one occasion McPhee made a nice save to clear the lines. Alsop should have scored several goals at this stage as our defence allowed some of their attackers to take up scoring positions. Their finishing was not up to 'scratch' and play returned to the other end. Hutchin broke clear but his long run took all the 'steam' out of him and by the time he was ready to shoot he was exhausted. From the corner well taken by Yarwood the ball arrived in the middle. SWINNERTON was on hand to 'crack' the ball into the back of the net. The pattern of the first half was a lot of Institute breaks, some looking suspiciously offside. Yarwood again found himself clear and a great through ball to Hutchin resulted in a fine save by the Alsop goalie.

Whenever Alsop attacked hard our defence looked hesitant and again a coloured attacker missed a golden chance after Rimmer failed to clear and Swinnerton could not get in the vital tackle. Clear with only McPhee to beat he shot wide. Their third goal should have followed immediately when again we were slow to tackle. They did score in the 23rd minute when a long centre avoided everybody and had to be handled off the line. The penalty kick was a good one and McPhee had no chance. Institute looked as if they were losing control as half time approached. Bunching in defence was leaving Alsop far too much room. Hutchin was now caught yards offside. Just before half time Institute were allowed to take a rather 'flattering' lead with an 'offside' break by Yarwood. He took his chance well and the score was 1-3.

A lead like this should have left us with an easy task in the 2nd half. Institute would now have the advantage of the slope. Everything now went terribly wrong. A rather harsh penalty award allowed Alsop back into the game and an own goal by Bohanna did not help. Raynard hit the post from 2 yards out and Yarwood and Hutchin were continually caught offside. The 2nd half was a bit of a nightmare and Institute came out losers at 4-3.

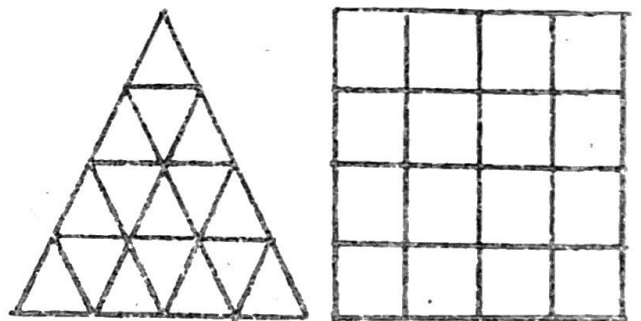

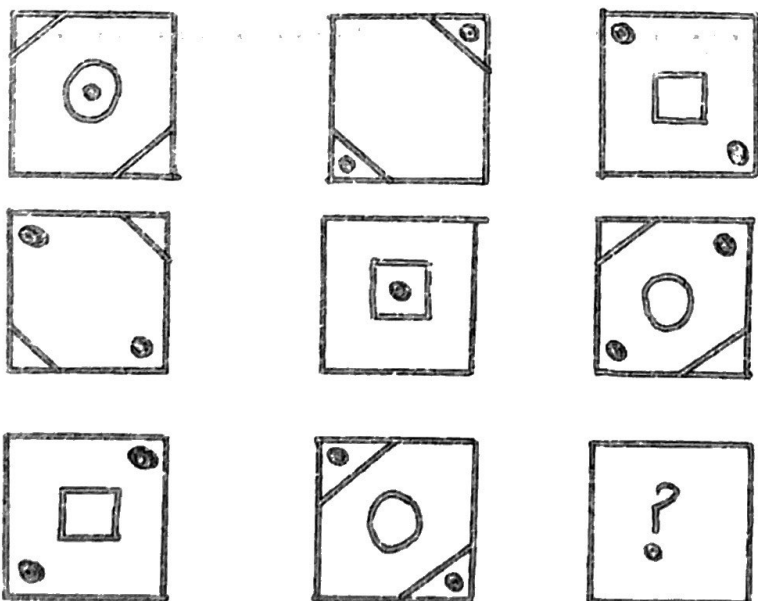

There had been heavy rain the previous night but the Alsop pitch was in good condition. Institute began the game in fine attacking style, with LONG making good runs down the right wing, provided with line balls by McHUGH. The first goal came from the head of LEUNG, from a free kick taken by LONG just outside the box. Institute continued to pressure the Alsop goal, and they increased their lead after 15 mins. This effort came from LEVY, who chased a through ball by MOONEY, and fired home from 10 yds. Alsop started to fight back as they built up fine moves from midfield. This pressure produced a well struck goal from the Alsop left midfielder. Institute replied to this revival and another LEVY goal 10 mins before the break, put Institute in a commanding position.

HALF-TIME 1-3

The second half began with spirited Alsop attacks as Institute seemed to lose the grip of the midfield. After a slow build-up on the left, Alsop pushed into the Institute penalty area, and despite a last-ditch tackle by QUIRK, the Alsop centre-forward managed to score. From this point on, Institute were pegged back in their own half, producing the odd breakaway to threaten the Alsop goal. It was one of these breakaways that produced a free-kick for Institute 8 yds. outside the Alsop box. McHUGH took this and his curled free-kick was met by MOONEY 5 yds. out and hammered home. This put Institute back in control as PARKINSON and WILKINSON helped out in defence.

A disputed corner decision brought about the third Alsop goal. The referee adjudged PETTIGREW to have carried the ball over the goal-line and when PETTIGREW protested the referee threatened to send him off. The corner was headed home to put Alsop back in with a chance.

Institute held out well, and NORBURY, sub. for LONG, almost sealed the win with 5 mins. to go.

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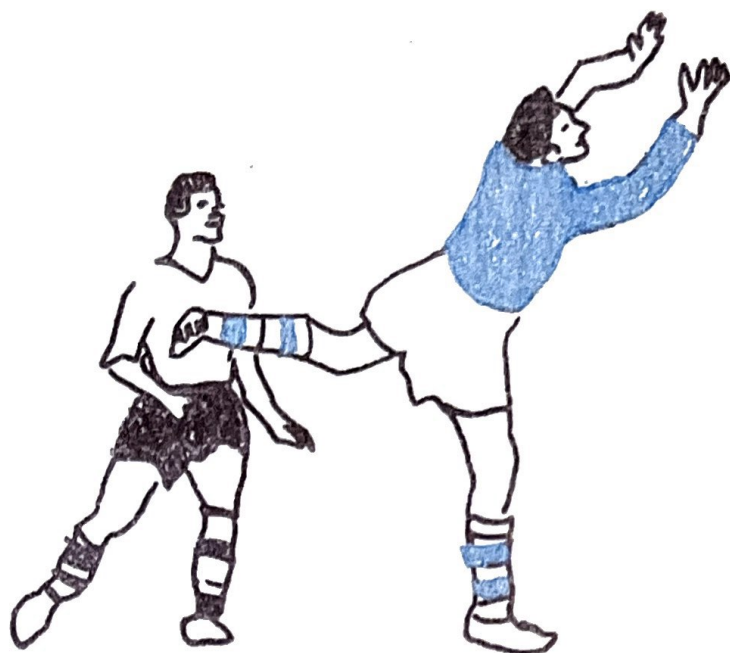
