SUMMARY OF LATIN SPEECH.

The Head Boy, R. Shaw-Smith, begins his speech in the Latin tongue by expressing his pleasure that he is able to welcome to our meeting to-night the Governors of the School and especially the Chairman, Mr. Lawrence Holt. He then greets the learned Judge, Sir John Morris, who by reason of the many honours he has earned has brought honour to his old School.
